“ I am so sorry to here that Jim passed away. He was always so happy and care free (in many ways like a kid). He word for me for 16 years while I was at Red Spot. Jim basically trained me in the lab, or dungeon as we always called it, when I started in 1985. I became his supervisor 6 months later. We worked on business machine coatings at first and then was assigned to develop a waterborne automotive coating. We met our goal by developing 296 series which was an industry first waterborne coating to be approved by all of the big three in Ford, GM, and Chrysler. He also later helped in developing and maintaining it's replacement in 396 series. I know he worked several overtime and weekend hours in helping with these coatings. I know he was as proud of these accomplishments as I was. I always appreciated him, as I hope Red Spot did as well.

The one tough thing I can always remember was having to get him out of the break room or restroom and having to write him up for it. It was the tough part about being a supervisor. I know he would get mad and I apologize to Lucky for it as I am sure he went home at times cussing me out. What he never understood was that it was like a parent disciplining a child as I think it hurt me more than it hurt him.

Unfortunately I haven't seen Jim since I left Red Spot 16 years ago in 2000. I knew he retired and moved to Kentucky as he had always planned and I hope he enjoyed it. I will always remember his hard work, dedication, and support during my time at Red Spot. He is in my prayers.
